# Project Updates

### Train Depot Restoration

The exterior restoration was completed in 2023, and the interior restoration is underway and scheduled to be completed this summer.

In 2022, the National Register of Historic Places and the State of Michigan placed the Village of Middleville Train Depot on the Historic Register. The Train Depot was one of the stops on the railroad line from Grand Rapids to Jackson, Michigan. The rail service started in 1869 and ended in 1972.

The track was abandoned in Middleville in 1983. The ownership of the Depot transferred to Thornapple Township in 2002 and the Village of Middleville acquired it in 2017.

Upcoming Construction Projects

High Street Reconstruction Project

High Street between Main and Washington is a major street in the Village and has long been a major route for residents and employees of businesses in our industrial park, primarily Bradford White. In addition to the road surface, there is an aging water and sewer infrastructure that needs to be replaced. This project will include all of these items in addition to storm drain and sidewalks. During this project, we will also replace all of the water services that may have been connected to a lead water line.

Third Street Reconstruction Project

The reconstruction of Third Street started in August 2023 and completion is planned for early summer of 2024. This project consisted of updating and improving the existing roadway, water main, sanitary sewer, and storm drain. The road and water main are undersized to properly serve our residents. Several lead or galvanized service lines were also replaced during this project. The west end of the street was very narrow so that was widened to 30 feet to conform to village standards, improve stormwater drainage, and serve the community better. The sanitary sewer was upgraded and replaced as well, which will enable the Department of Public Works to clean sewer lines on an annual basis, rather than monthly.

The construction cost of this project is \$1.349 million which is coming from an MDOT grant for \$250,000, the Local Development Finance Authority (LDFA) committed to \$750,000, and the Village is spending \$349,000.

Dearborn Street Reconstruction Project Dearborn Street reconstruction began on April 8, 2024, and will

Dearborn Street reconstruction began on April 8, 2024, and will continue through June 2024. The reconstruction of Dearborn Street is needed to replace an outdated water main, rebuild the street foundation, replace a culvert under the road, and add a sidewalk to the south side of the road. In the fall of 2022, the water main on Dearborn had a significant break, causing the road to buckle in about a 100ft section. Completing this project will improve the overall reliability of the Village water system, replace a culvert under the road, and add a sidewalk to help connect the Village sidewalk system and to improve the walkability and pedestrian safety in the Village.

The total cost for this project is \$673,519.50.

The Village worked collaboratively with TK Schools to add an access drive to the south end of McFall Elementary to assist with traffic flow during parent pick up and drop off.

The total cost for this project is \$765,033.

The Village Department of Public Works looks forward to the upcoming construction season to help improve all our systems. Thank you to all of the residents for your patience during these projects while we continuously work to improve our community and provide a safe and quality place for you to work and live. # Village Manager Spotlight

Over the past several years, the Village Council has been focused on improving infrastructure throughout the village. Infrastructure can include things like sanitary sewers, municipal drinking water, roads, sidewalks, etc. Over the past year, the council has focused its efforts on replacing all the old lead



water service lines and improving internet and security throughout the downtown area. The Village received funds from the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA), which we have used to add security cameras to our buildings and downtown park areas along with replacing water service lines as mandated by the state.

Recently the Village Council has engaged the Michigan Municipal League in some leadership training and followed up with a strategic planning process which they are currently working through. They were intentional to include members of the council, village staff, Thornapple Township officials, Thornapple Kellogg Schools, Parks and Recreation, and the Downtown Development Authority in their discussions. Once completed, we will publish the strategic plan on our website with printed copies available to anyone if they stop by the village office.

The Council is also interested in knowing the thoughts of their neighbors, the residents of Middleville. The Village Council meets every 2nd and 4th Tuesday at 7 pm for their regular meetings along with every 1st Tuesday at 4:30 pm for its committee of the whole. The public is welcome to speak during public comment at any of our posted meetings. If that doesn't work for you, you are always welcome to speak to me directly. I am normally found at the Village Hall during regular office hours but can also be reached at stolsonburgc@villageofmiddleville. org or 269-795-3385. 

The Sewer (17%) and Water (15%) Funds are called "enterprise funds" because they support themselves as a business would. They do not depend on tax dollars. This year's increase in the Sewer Fund is because of the bond for the expansion of the wastewater treatment plant. The WWTP had to be upgraded to accommodate the recent growth in the Village.

The Major (15%) Street Funds monies come from both Act 51 (gas tax) and residents' taxes, while the Local (6%) Street Funds come from just Act 51. Divided across the state, cities and villages get 21.8% of each penny of gas tax to pay to maintain local streets.

### THORNAPPLE TOWNSHIP FIRE DEPARTMENT



Thornapple Township is well served with a highly trained professional staff of approximately fortyfive members who work full-time, part-time or paid-on-call. The station is staffed 24 hours a day, seven days a week, with two firefighters/paramedics and an additional ambulance staffed 12 hours daily to maintain operational integrity. If you are interested in becoming part of our team, please inquire at the station! We are always looking for more firefighters.

The highly trained personnel, paired with Engine 52, which was put in service last May, has allowed the department to broadly meet the National Fire Protection Agency (NFPA) 1720 standard for structure fires. The department responds to various emergencies including, but not limited to, fires, auto accidents, medical emergencies, hazardous materials, and technical rescue incidents.

The department has two fire engines, a tanker, a brush rig, a UTV, and four ambulances to serve the community. The newest unit in our fleet is Bravo 54, which is a 2024 Crestline type III basic life support ambulance. This unit can be upgraded to advanced life support, the highest level of prehospital care, when staffing allows. Our community is blessed to have six local paramedics who work for the department and respond to calls off duty, allowing for greater coverage to the citizens we serve. Some of the advanced skills paramedics perform are cardiac monitoring and electrical therapy, administering emergency medications, establishing intravenous therapies, and providing advanced airways.

All the equipment and apparatus the department currently has is compliant, but Thornapple Fire Department has a replacement schedule for large purchases to make sure we are able to serve the community effectively. The next fire engine will be purchased in 2031 but must be ordered in 2029. The new fire engine has an anticipated purchase price of \$1.8 million, which is more than twice the cost of our last engine purchase. We also replace our ambulances every 3-4 years at a current cost of \$200,000.

Maintaining these standards will allow us to get our department re-evaluated by ISO, the company who evaluates and rates fire departments. Some of the departmental changes over the last two years should allow the community members to see an appreciable decrease in their homeowner's insurance rates once we are reclassed by ISO anticipating the re-evaluation in the next 6-12 months.


Thornapple Fire Department has also increased its educational offerings to provide the community CPR and First aid classes every three months. The department will also be hosting Emergency Medical Technician (EMT) classes this fall, call or email us for more information.






We've all heard the old saying, "*There are only two guarantees in life: death and taxes.*". No one, absolutely no one, likes to pay property taxes. Since we do have to pay them, however, the expectation is always that those tax dollars be spent wisely by those charged to collect and safeguard them.

Thornapple Township is the collection agent for seven entities: State of Michigan, Barry County, KISD, GRCC, TK Schools, Caledonia Schools, and Thornapple Township. Our total tax roll for 2023 was approximately \$15.6 million. While most folks know we are charged with the responsibility of collecting those tax dollars, the misconception is that all those \$15.6 million dollars are kept and spent by the Township. Instead, we are charged with properly collecting and redistributing those funds. Approximately 9% of the tax dollars collected remain at Thornapple Township, with the remaining portion redistributed to the entities listed above. Please refer to the related graphs to see how your tax dollars are allocated. As you will see, more than half of the Township's tax dollars are restricted for use to operate emergency services within the Township (fire department and ambulance service, equipment and capital improvement). The administration fees generated from property taxes help to fund both the Assessing and Treasury Departments at the Township, as both "assessing" and "tax collection" are two of the Township's statutory duties (along with "elections"). The dollars allocated to general operating are exactly that, the funds necessary to staff the township, help pay for roads, our cemeteries, street lighting, and the general day-to-day expenses necessary to operate the Township and Hall efficiently. A portion of our general operating dollars are "captured" by and paid to the Village's DDA (Downtown Development Authority) and LDFA (Local Development Finance Authority). The Township's elected officials, as well as the staff, try their best everyday to do and provide more for Thornapple Township residents at the lowest possible cost.
